HUMAN STORIES

In this edition of our newsletter, we highlight the profound impact of second chances through personal stories shared at

Singapore Management University (SMU) on 12 March 2025. ISCOS Titan Mr Mohamad Fairizal Bin Jaffar, an inspiring ex-offender and active desistor, delivered a powerful and candid account of his journey, motivating students to embrace the cause. Adding to this, Adjunct Lecturer Ms Wang Yean Sung and student Tan Ye Kai, Dexter shared their reflections, discussing how these engagements deepened their understanding of YRP's mission and inspired meaningful contributions. Together, their voices illustrate the transformative power of open dialogue in fostering reintegration, second chances, and community support.





Mr Mohamad Fairizal Bin Jaffar

The Industrial and Services Co-operative Society Limited (ISCOS) has long supported ex-offenders and their families, with the ISCOS Titans Programme empowering desistors to share their personal stories of transformation.

At a recent engagement at SMU on 12 March 2025, ISCOS Titan Mohamad Fairizal Bin Jaffar spoke candidly about his journey, addressing students on the challenges of reintegration and the importance of resilience.

"This isn't just about awareness," Fairizal emphasised. "It's about opening minds to the reality of our day-to-day struggles, and why support is everything for people like me." His message to others on their reintegration journey remains simple yet powerful: "Find what drives you and keep moving. Even if it's tough – especially when it's tough – push yourself forward."

To Adjunct Lecturer Ms Wang Yean Sung, giving second chances is not just about charity – they are about recognising potential and shared humanity. Ms Wang believes Singapore's highly competitive nature can make society less forgiving, but sees promise in the government's efforts to uplift and support ex-offenders. "If we leave people behind, what's the point of being in front?" she reflected.

Her most memorable moment from the school outreach engagement was Mr Fairizal's personal story of struggle. She believes that her students in their youth are at a vulnerable stage where the right message can make a lasting difference – not through fear, but through hope and purpose. "Gangs offer a sense of belonging. But so can opportunity, mentorship and care," she said. Yean Sung urges more adults, retirees, and companies to step up. "There does not have to be grand gestures, just small, meaningful acts," Yean Sung said. "We don't always know how to give back, but it starts with caring. Everyone deserves a fair shot."




Tan Ye Kai, Dexter

For student Tan Ye Kai, Dexter, the sharing session proved to be an eye-opening experience. Listening to Mr Fairizal's powerful personal account, he gained a deeper understanding of the emotional and psychological barriers ex-offenders continue to face after release.

Dexter was struck by how stigma forces ex-offenders to invest substantial effort in regaining trust-often at the cost of opportunities to demonstrate their true abilities. "If we show a bit more empathy, it really can go a long way in helping ex-offenders reintegrate," Dexter reflected. "Greater societal acceptance could lower recidivism and create a healthier community."

His view of YRP was once limited to its partnerships with organisations such as Ninja Van and 18 Chefs. However, the engagement broadened his perspective, reinforcing the idea that everyone has a role in shifting societal perceptions—whether through active involvement in outreach, encouraging peers to participate in future discussions, or offering a simple gesture of kindness to someone who may feel excluded.

from Raffles Institution


Project Defteros, a dynamic youth group from Raffles Institution, is making waves in advocating for second chances and supporting families of the incarcerated! At the recent SPS-YRSG Corporate Advance 2025, the group showcased their innovative approach towards YRP's 3As objectives through an interactive game-'Knock Down Barriers'. Participants engaged in a meaningful activity where they physically knocked down cans representing misconceptions about exoffenders, whilst learning about the importance of breaking stereotypes.

The event also featured a photo booth where attendees could capture moments and write down messages of encouragement for ex-offenders to show their support for second chances. As one team member, Reuben, powerfully expressed, "No human is born perfect, and we should not judge someone based on their past. Someone's past does mot represent their future." Through their creative engagement, Project Defteros continues to challenge societal prejudices and champion the cause of rehabilitation and reintegration.


